What the wren eats

Wrens are primarily insectivorous, and don't often appear at bird feeders. In the wild, wrens eat spiders, beetles, caterpillars, flies and other insects. They also will consume snail shells to provide calcium and digestive grit.

Wingspan and Lifespan

A wrens wing span is 13 to 17 inches

Predators

Predators of House Wrens at the nest include cats, rats, opossums, woodpeckers, foxes, raccoons, squirrels, snakes and owls.

Predators

Birds such as Blue Jays, Cooper's hawks and sharp-shinned Hawks are the most likely predators of adult Carolina wrens. Carolina wren eggs and nestlings are eaten by raccoons, black rat snakes, gray squirrels, mink, gray foxes and eastern chipmunks.

The range of the wren

The Range of the Carolina wren is from Louisiana to Ohio and from Indiana to North Carolina. Its habitat is forest thickets and suburban areas. The House wren has a range of Ohio to south Canada and it lives in thickets forests and suburban areas.

The Reproduction

The mating of a wren is they do a mating call and the female comes to them and they mostly mate north of the southern united states. They lay 3 to 5 eggs per mate

Dieases

The wrens can give and get salmonella, Aspergilliosis, Avian pox, mites, lice and Lyme Disease
